


Aluman Touch

God's world today needs healing. My treasured sisters and brothers in Christ, we are living in a world where human beings are injuring one another. Prejudice and hatred and violence are wrong. God creates human hands to touch others with tenderness and care. For far too long, though, you and I have been witnessing people harming people. This is tragic. How this must sadden Life-giving God. As children of God, you and I are summoned to intervene. You and I are empowered by God to overcome evil with good.

The culture in which you and I live discourages human touch. This is ironic, because most everything cutting edge now is touch screen! Having fingerprint access to anything from an ATM to a cell phone is all the rage. Most of what people today crave is "virtual" stuff. Think about it. Person-to-person contact, human touch is left out of everyday life. Routinely, extreme caution is advised when it comes to physical contact between human beings. Everyone from parents to teachers to clergy is counseled to exercise utmost restraint. Granted, in some circumstances, such counsel is sound. Nevertheless, isn't it fascinating to consider WWJD? The Gospel record gives us a clear indication. Jesus touches. That's right, the Son of God frequently offers human touch.

One might argue, "Well, Jesus was living in a completely different era." True. However, I believe that, if Jesus of Nazareth were walking around in our day and age, he would still be touching people.

Can I prove this? No.

This is one of a wide realm of areas which simply require faith. I have faith that, at every juncture in human history, God conveys love and caring through physical touch. In my heart, this is who I believe God is. This is how I believe God acts. For me, the New Testament Gospels inform this belief.

Jesus touched others, and Jesus allowed himself to "be touched" by others.

"...two blind men followed Jesus, crying loudly, 'Have mercy on us, Son of David!'...and Jesus asked them, 'Do you believe that I am able to do this?' They answered, 'Yes, Lord.' Then Jesus touched their eyes and said, 'According to your faith, let it be done to you.' And their eyes were opened." (Matthew 9:27-30) Jesus touches.

"A leper came to Jesus, begging...and kneeling... Moved with pity, Jesus reached out his hand and touched him, and said, 'I do choose. Be made clean.' Immediately, the leprosy left him, and he (Human Touch continued from page 1)

was made clean." (Mark 1:40-42) Jesus touches.

"People were bringing little children to Jesus in order that he might touch them... And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them." (Mark 10:13, 16) Jesus touches.

"...he had cured so many, that all who had diseases pressed upon him to touch him." (Mark 3:10)

"...they came to land at Gennesaret. After the people of that place recognized Jesus, they... brought all who were sick to him, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed." (Matthew 14:34-36)

Once, a diseased woman snuck up on Jesus for a healing touch. (Matthew 9; Mark 5; Luke 8) Guess what? Jesus noticed! "Then Jesus asked, 'Who touched me?... Someone touched me; for I noticed that power had gone out from me.' When the woman... came trembling; and falling down before him, she declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him, and how she had been immediately healed. Jesus said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace.'" (Luke 8:45-46) This daring woman who is experiencing a 'brush with death' risks brushing the hem of Jesus' robe, and she receives healing! Jesus touches.

From there, Jesus proceeds to Jairus' home and discovers a huge commotion, for Jairus' daughter already has died. But Jesus sends everyone except her parents out of the house. Then what? Then Jesus touches her, of course. In his mother tongue, Jesus says, 'Talitha, cum. Little girl, arise.' And the child lives! The Son of God who will himself be resurrected from death resurrects this lifeless daughter from death. Jesus touches.

Later, after his own resurrection, Jesus invites, "Touch me." (Luke 24:39)

Jesus says to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." (John 20:27)

Yes, Jesus is forever willing to be touched and to touch. How beautiful!

In her boldly honest <u>Searching for Sunday</u>, Rachel Held Evans expounds, "There is power in touch—a connective energy, a sweet bond… From infancy, we ache for the warmth of one another's skin. healed with his hands...there is something about that touch, that act of consecration, which turns a prayer into a pulse that ripples right down to the toes. Just as God comes to us through water and wine, God comes to us through touch, through the holy acts of holy hands. The hands of a pastor will baptize babies, type out sermons, and draw crosses of ashes over penitent brows. They will break bread, and pour wine, and shelter unwieldy Advent flames. They will grasp the speckled arms of the elderly, the sticky fingers of toddlers, the trembling hands of the sick, the lifeless palms of the dead. And they will rest on the heads of others so called.... Ultimately, all are commissioned. All are called. All belong to the holy order of God's beloved. The hands that pass the peace can pass a meal to the man on the street. The hands that cup together to receive Christ in the bread will extend to receive Christ in the immigrant, the refugee, the lonely, or the sick. Hands plant, and uproot, and cook, and caress. They repair, and re-wire, and change diapers, and dress wounds. Hands tickle ajagling children and wipe away tears. Hands rub heaving bellies of big, ugly dogs. Hands sanctify all sorts of ordinary things and make them holy. Through touch, God gave us the power to injure or to heal, to wage war or to wash feet. Let us not forget the gravity of that. Let us not forget the call."

God's blessing is given to us, so that we will bless. Now is the time. People are yearning to be touched. Offer God's touch to a world in need. Be a healer and a foot washer. Touch humankind with sensitivity, compassion and grace. May your hands serve as healing hands.
