

God's Transforming Promises

God promises big things. And God delivers!

"For God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' made God's light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels (clay jars) to show that transcendent (all-surpassing) power belongs to God and not to us." (2 Corinthians 4:6-7)

In her provocative work Scarred by Struggle, Transformed by Hope (Eerdman's Publishing Company, Grand Rapids, MI, 2005), a Benedictine nun named Joan Chittister reveals and celebrates that through Holy God there always is opportunity for transformation. Everyone goes through times of pain and sorrow, depression and darkness, stress and suffering. It can be through life's struggles, however, that we grow and receive new insights enabling us to go on. Building on the biblical story of Jacob wrestling with God (Genesis 32) and on the story of her own battle with life-changing disappointment, Sister Joan Chittister courageously explores the landscape of suffering and hope, dealing with wide-ranging topics, such as consumerism, technology, grief, injustice with regard to roles of women in the Roman Catholic Church, and the events of September 11, 2001. "We struggle," Sister Joan says, "against change,

isolation, darkness, fear, powerlessness, vulnerability, exhaustion, and scarring. While such struggles sometimes seem insurmountable, we can emerge from them with the gifts of conversion, detachment, faith, courage, surrender, limitations, endurance, transformation, and (perhaps most important) hope." Each of these struggles and gifts is discussed in depth. This is a book written by Sister Joan in an effort to help readers cope with their own personal suffering and disappointment. Scarred by Struggle, Transformed by Hope is, in the author's own words, "an anatomy of struggle and an account of the way hope grows in us, despite our moments of darkness, regardless of our bouts of depression. It is an invitation to look again at the struggles of life in order that we might remember how to recognize new life in our souls the next time our hearts turn again to clay."

The hopeful message here is that God's promises are fulfilled. Although we do encounter disasters and heartbreaks over the course of our earthly lives, the promises of God endure. "God's agapé love is patient. Love is kind. Love is not envious or boastful or rude... Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. God's agapé love never ends!" (1 Corinthians 13: 4-5, 7-8) Yes, God's promises are true! Maybe not today, maybe not this month, but ultimately, God will fulfill God's promises. This is "better-than-good" news. This is spectacular, uplifting, tremendous news!

The celebrated poet and author Thomas Stearns Eliot was born September 26, 1888 in St. Louis, Missouri. East Coker is the name of a charming, lovely, little village in the open countryside of Somerset, England. The village is the ancestral home of T. S. Eliot.

"East Coker" is the second poem in his masterpiece Four Quartets. T. S. Eliot writes:

"In my beginning is my end. In succession Houses rise and fall, crumble, are extended, Are removed, destroyed, restored, or in their place Is an open field, or a factory, or a by-pass. Old stone to new building, old timber to new fires, Old fires to ashes, and ashes to the earth, Which is already flesh, fur, and faeces, Bone of man and beast, cornstalk and leaf. Houses live and die: there is a time for building And a time for living and for generation And a time for the wind to break the loosened pane And to shake the wainscot where the field-mouse trots And to shake the tattered arras woven with a silent motto.

In my beginning is my end. Now the light falls Across the open field, leaving the deep lane Shuttered with branches, dark in the afternoon, Where you lean against a bank while a van passes And the deep lane insists on the direction Into the village, in the electric heat Hypnotised. In a warm haze the sultry light Is absorbed, not refracted, by grey stone. The dahlias sleep in the empty silence. Wait for the early owl.

In that open field If you do not come too close, if you do not come too close On a summer midnight, you can hear the music Of the weak pipe and the little drum And see them dancing around the bonfire...

Leaping through the flames, or joined in circles, Rustically solemn or in rustic laughter Lifting heavy feet in clumsy shoes, Earth feet, loam feet, lifted in country mirth Mirth of those long since under earth Nourishing the corn. Keeping time, Keeping the rhythm in their dancing As in their living in the living seasons

WHO WAS ESTHER?

More like, how did Esther become a Persian queen since she was a Jew?

King Ahasuerus who ruled Achaemenid Empire between 486 and 465 BC (over one hundred twentyseven provinces from India to Ethiopia).

The Jewish people had been under the Persian rule for nearly seventy years. A promise that God made through Jeremiah. ('For thus says the Lord: Only when Babylon's seventy years are completed will I visit you, and I will fulfill to you my promise and bring you back to this place.' Jeremiah 29:10) The Jewish people would be exiled and ruled by kings that were not their own.

By the time of his third year as king, Ahasuerus, (miscalculating the years the prophecy referred to) celebrated the passing of the seventy years with the Jewish people still under his thumb. Near the end of the celebration he requested his queen, Vashti, to attend. Yet she refused. Some scholars say that he had her executed. Then of course he just had to find another woman to be queen. As a matter of tradition, Persian kings did not marry women that were not Persian and of noble birth. How is it he finds Esther?

In the Book of Esther (chapter two), we find out how Esther actually becomes the new queen.

Music and lyrics of the beloved hymn <u>In the Bulb There</u> <u>Is a Flower</u> (also known by the alternate title <u>Hymn of</u> <u>Promise</u>) were composed in 1985 by Natalie Sleethe. This hymn is set to Sleethe's Tune PROMISE 8.7.8.7.D. Sleethe drew inspiration for her lyrics from the above poem, "East Coker" by T. S. Eliot. The final verse of her hymn opens, "In our end is our beginning; In our time, infinity. In our doubt, there is believing; In our life, eternity..."

Ah, yes, God's promises endure. The promise of life eternal offered by the Son of God, Jesus Christ, is a promise which God will fulfill. On one occasion, as he was walking from Judea back to Galilee, Jesus took a rest stop and sat down beside Jacob's well in the Samaritan town of Sychar. A local woman came to draw water from the well. Jesus asked her for a drink of water, but the woman guestioned his request. Then

Jesus proclaimed, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink the water that I will give will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to life eternal." (John 4:13-14)

Greetings God's Beloved,






